I remember the wonderful time I had with all of you during my summer assignment there. I wish to extend an invitation to all of you to my Diaconate ordination. Please also pray for Deacon Anderw Hamilton who will be ordained to the Priesthood on June 3. God Bless, Craig Alexander Dear Parishioners, A long line of witnesses to God...

Someone pointed out to me that he attended Sunday Mass at another Catholic church last week where he learned that the congregation had been instructed by their priest to pray the Apostles' Creed in place of the Nicaean Creed during the Eastern Season. He wondered why we didn't do the same. I replied that the option is a legitimate option but not an obligatory one.

Honestly, however, I was thinking practically about not wishing to invited confusion over the text to be prayed.

We Catholics follow the lead of our ancestor-believers who recognized that telling one another **what we believe**, **and**, therefore, **what we do not believe**, keeps us **closer to Christ**, the Center and the Summit of our faith. We **never accepted** that each of us is the "sole arbiter of belief" because **we believe together and hold one another accountable to the Faith that saves us**. We received that faith; we didn't make it up or determine it by our own personal reading of the Bible.

One church historian says that very early in Christian catechesis, in preparing candidates for baptism, bishops and priests formulated a "**Rule of Faith**" expressive of the **major tenants of faith in Jesus, Lord and Messiah**. Sounds like the roots of our own RCIA process to bring people to full communion of faith. **One** of these early documents has been preserved **in the writings of St. Irenaeus** (he died in 200) who famously **traced his own faith** back to the Apostle and Evangelist, **John**. Those who prepared these professions did so, the historian contends, because **not all aspects of belief had been defined**, for example, which scriptures made up the New Testament. The same historian also says that **people were getting the major portions wrong**, for example, was Jesus truly God and truly Man?

Why this focus on the Apostles' Creed? Just how old is that statement of what we believe? One scholar says that the final form we read dates to the 700s, while the substance and most of the phrasing is another Baptismal credal statement used in Rome in the 100s, called the "Roman Symbol." In the 300s, both St. Ambrose and St. Augustine urged their congregations to pray the Symbol daily, to keep themselves firmly rooted.

The Apostles' Creed uses some language not emphasized in the later Nicaean Creed, for example the phrase stating the Jesus "descended into hell," and the profession we make in "the communion of saints."

One Orthodox church, the Antiochian, defines "communion of saints" thus: When Christians depart this life, they remain a vital part of the Church, the Body of Christ. **They are alive in the Lord and "registered in heaven" (Hebrews 12:23).** They wor-ship God (Revelation 4:10) and inhabit His heavenly dwelling places (John 14:2). In the Eucharist we come "to the city of the living God" and join in communion with the saints in our worship of God (Hebrews 12:22). They are that great "cloud of witnesses" which sur-rounds us, and we seek to imitate them in running "the race that is set before us" (Hebrews 12:1). **Rejecting or ignoring the** communion of saints is a denial that those who have died in Christ are still part of his Holy Church.

By the time the Reformation rolls around, some "reformers" put forth their own novel explanations in preference to those of the apostolically founded church, for example in calling into question how physically dead "saints" can be alive and how any prayers offered through them might be efficacious. (Jesus had some answers in the gospels). Another Orthodox theologian says that we should always **distinguish worship of God** (think of our "Gloria" at Mass, in how we express our honor for God), **from intercessory prayer** in which we ask for assistance. **First, we ask Christ** for all that we seek, for He is a mediator for us. **But we believe** that **holy ones are present to God and so we easily, naturally, and gracefully ask them to intercede for us with Jesus.**

At our Second Vatican Council, the bishops affirmed the living reality of the Communion of Saints, recognizing that "some of [Christ's] disciples are pilgrims on earth, others have died and are being purified, while still others are in glory."

Pray the Apostles' Creed, fully aware of the faith you have in unity with generations of believers in Jesus, Lord, Savior, and Messiah and in unity with his saints.
