Dear Parishioners,

A Dangerous Vocation

Throughout the Easter Season, the gospel readings for Masses most often come from the "Fourth Gospel," the one penned by John the Apostle, whom we also know as "the Evangelist" or "the Beloved Disciple." **This Gospel "runs deep,"** for example, in singling out signs of God's work in and through Jesus, in ways that build the case that Jesus acted as **so much more than a prophet** and

as Jesus revealed "I AM" to a generation longing to experience God and discontented with religious practice and leadership. "Just the facts" fails to rise to an essential level for living Faith.

At daily and weekend Masses, we read phrases and sentences like these: "If the world hates you, realize that it hated me first. If you belonged to the world, the world would love its own; but because you do not belong to the world, and I have chosen you out of the world, the world hates you." (John 15:18) "If they persecuted me, they will also persecute you." (15:20) The phenomenon written about here describes more than an historical occurrence, referring instead to a way of being with God. Were this phrasing referencing persecution only shortly after the Passion-Death-Resurrection-Ascension of Jesus, the Messiah, we might expect that we had passed through that phase to a calmer and gentler time of acceptance of Christ.

How ought we consider what happened in recent weeks on the far side of heady days in Jerusalem at a bloody hilltop and at an empty tomb? The Vatican reports that in a certain region of India, the local Archbishop, Peter Machado, said that there has recently been a resurgence of harassment against Christians, instigated by Muslims and Hindus, in the state. The Archbishop says, "We have received reports that three churches built in 1974 and some houses have been set on fire, and the people have been forced to flee to safer places." Reports of over a dozen more churches being burned and desecrated, and Jesuit priests being threatened have also surfaced. "It demonstrates the gravity of the danger faced by people who are being targeted for their religious beliefs and practices," the archbishop added.

Around **50** Christians, including **10** pastors, were attacked in an Indian village in Chhattisgarh State on Sunday, April **30**, following accusations of religious conversion by a radical Hindu party. Rumors held that Hindus were forced to convert; Christians replied that this fake news amounted to anti-Christian propaganda. The community had gathered to pray in a private home when an armed mob, reportedly belonging to the militant Hindu nationalist organization, Bajrang Dal, surrounded the home, barged in, and stopped them. Fearing for their safety, the Christians locked themselves inside the house and called the police. But when the police arrived, they reportedly arrested the house's owner, the pastors, and a few other Christians for "disturbing the peace."

Elsewhere, from Egypt, the Patriarch of the Coptic Orthodox Church, Pope
Tawadros II, came to Rome to visit Pope Francis, with thanksgiving for an agreement signed fiftyyears ago, affirming common belief in the Incarnation. Pope Tawadros reported on the troubles
endured by Christians and brought to Pope Francis relics of twenty-one Coptic Christian
Martyrs who were beheaded in Lybia in 2015 by members of an extremist Islamic State. On
the video of their execution, viewers see the men praying and affirming their faith in Christ. Pope
Francis added the names of these martyrs to the Calendar of the Roman Catholic Church.
Tawadros also spoke of how Muslims persecuted Christians from the first in Egypt by
insisting on denial of Christ and harsh punishments and penalties if they refused, such as
economically destructive taxation on Christians alone.

Celebrate Jesus Christ's Ascension into heaven, but do not forget his warning to us that many in the world will hate us precisely because we have listened to and accepted the Voice of Christ directing and guiding us. We have come to know Christ and God the Father he has been revealed to us by Jesus.

English poet, Robert Browning once penned a brief poem that many know only in an incomplete context. The memorable line reads "God's in his heaven, all's right with the world." The poem actually refers to a context of sinful, criminal behavior to which the appearance of God brings a renewal of innocence. We hope for the same through repentance, forgiveness, charity, and rebirth.
