

#### More on our Worship at Mass

Dear Parishioners,

In 1955 the Holy See or governing body of the Roman Catholic Church assigned the Capuchin-Franciscan Province headquartered in Pittsburgh to evangelize, that is, to introduce the native peoples of Papua New Guinea to the Catholic, Christian Faith. Because of World War II and its intrusions into the primitive interior highlands of that island, the peoples there had already seen some of the best and a lot of the worst of the strangely pale-

skinned races that now were reappearing among them a little bit at a time. Both the overseeing Australian government and the Holy See believed that sending "missionaries" would better protect the people in introducing them to the world beyond their beautiful homeland. So, there were no Christians when the mission began where now a church thrives in PNG.

When I served as Provincial, I had a responsibility to visit our brothers and priests ministering there, every other year. On each visit I accompanied my fellow Capuchins as we went out to lead Sunday Masses celebrated in both a local language and in the "trade language," named "Pigin." I remember that we arrived at one village after a two-and-one-half-hour drive over treacherous roads to find a parish church, complete with a small bell tower out front, ushers or greeters at the doors, lectors, servers, Eucharistic ministers, musicians, and choirs. People introduced themselves as members of the Pastoral Council or of the Finance Council, or Catechists.

As Mass began, I followed along in the Pigin which is not difficult to understand since it mimics English both in grammar and vocabulary. I felt as if I were back in the States at parishes where I had assisted. At one point, I began to compare the parishioners to people I knew quite well in our churches in Cumberland or Cleveland or Herman or York or Charleston.

The way of worshiping was exactly the same as were the roles of service for worship that we supply here in Pennsylvania. They sang processional hymns to gather; they sat in their favorite places (often on matts on the floor); they greeted one another warmly; they quieted the children; they prayed a penitential rite; they listened to the same readings that I read in my trusty missalette; they sang a responsorial psalm and intoned the alleluia before the gospel; they had a small procession with the gospel book. Maybe they had prepared especially well for the visit of the Provincial, but they strongly impressed me. After Mass many of the ladies wanted to touch my beard and rub my head with my short American, white-man's haircut.

Each priest delivered a homily, often first in Pigin (or at the coastal churches, in English), but then translated into the local language of that place (called Talk-place). Intercessions followed the profession of Faith in the Creed.

Please note with me here that what we learn about the earliest Christian worship has translated even to this remote place with a church seventy years old. And note the universality of our worship, that is, we are "catholic" in more than a title; we must open the doors to all, everywhere we go.

Two other aspects of our worship that are ancient and worthy of noting as we speak of the Liturgy of God's Word: before he proclaims the Gospel, the priest, bowing before the altar, prays silently, that he may be made worthy to proclaim God's Good News, that his lips and mind and heart might be purified. The reference here is to Isaiah who envisions a coal from the Temple altar burning away what is useless, profane and mundane. When the priest or deacon proclaims the Gospel, he prays in humility and marks with his thumb his forehead, his lips, and his heart with a Cross, praying that the Lord be in his mind, on his lips, and in his heart The congregation does the same, praying "Lord, be in my mind, on my lips, and in my heart as I hear your Word." At the conclusion of the "proclamation of the Gospel." the priest or deacon raises the book slightly and out of respect for God's words, kisses the book.
