Dear Parishioners,

Another Perspective

When I departed Indiana county for the southern New Jersey shore on October 20, I had few expectations and just three goals: to rest deeply, to exercise freely, and to read without deadlines or distractions. The very small “efficiency” condo-apartment which I booked on-line proved to be just as it appeared in photographs and descriptions: small, a bit cramped; a comfortable bed; L-shaped coaches; two large screened television; kitchenette (two propane burners; microwave; fridge; no oven; small round table with four sturdy chairs for eating); a most adequate bathroom; and, a narrow balcony with an outdoor chair with a view (one block away) to the Atlantic Ocean and all points east. Since I was vacationing alone, I found that every need I could think of was provided for in this simple place.

Late October/early November is decidedly “off-season” at the ocean, but the well-kept secret whispers that the southern Jersey coast enjoys mild temperatures and moderate to full sun this time of the year. For two days the ocean breezes whipped along so forcefully that I couldn’t bicycle comfortably (although I could and did walk a lot). So, I got to know the residential neighborhoods in North Wildwood and met a fair number of people. The streets and the ocean paths/boardwalks were safe to walk, even in the dark. Apparently like other communities along the shore, this one is a place where people from Philadelphia and other urban centers come to play, to rest, to exercise, and to interact with family and friends.

Why am I writing this in our church bulletin? Because I discovered some hopeful signs in the community there. The local Catholic Parish, *Notre Dame de Mer*, with a Sunday-use church named in honor of St. Ann and a weekday one named Assumption, were well attended for October. Both churches were once separate parishes. There seemed to be easily 400 to 500 attending the Saturday evening Mass which I attended. While the congregation consisted of many persons with more grey than other hair pigments (black, blonde, brown, green, blue), there were a fair number of children and teenagers in attendance. The parish has two assigned priests and a permanent deacon; all three preached well-prepared and well- executed homilies, each with a different style but all with solid content. The congregation listened without distraction. Music was beautiful, accompanied either on a grand piano or on the pipe organ, supplemented with a wind instrument at one Mass and with a guitar at another. Cantors, both male and female, sang well and articulated the lyrics clearly. At one Mass a choir of about ten persons led music. Lectors obviously prepared for their role in advance. People in the pews followed the liturgy in the paper-bound missalette provided. Ushers took their roles seriously not only in collecting the offerings but in welcoming and bidding farewell (seems bulletins were made available only after Mass concluded). I counted eight stations for the distribution of Holy Communion. One weekend the Sunday collection amounted to \$15,000.

The parish reported on two charitable outreaches, one assisting with food staples and another with shelter for homeless persons. A brief report from the director of one agency appealed for greater contribution because needs were increasing. The Knights of Columbus were quite actively engaged in the community. A local Catholic school seemed to be strong – I didn’t learn a lot about it, but I heard from others about support offered by designated evenings at a local restaurant.

The bulletins were about eight pages long, with plenty of advertisers on the back pages. Signs posted outside the church said that the parish had Eucharistic Adoration offered through the week for a number of hours each day, after the morning Mass and until mid-afternoon. Bible study and continuing education efforts were listed along with Faith Formation classes.

As I walked the neighborhoods, I was surprised to see so many homes or buildings with small statues of the Blessed Virgin outdoors.

We priests can be critical when we visit other parishes. This place impressed me. Philadelphia and Camden may “be a lost cause” to crime and drugs and people fleeing the old neighborhoods (as two gentlemen told me). Even the physical buildings of the Philly seminary are terribly run-down (they will move to a new location in a year). But I find it reassuring that people like us are practicing our faith and living it out, even at the beach! Praise the Lord for God’s good work among us.
