Dear Parishioners, Christ, the Prince of Peace

Did you notice that the Indiana Cinema at the Mall is playing a new, epic (170 minutes) bio-cinema on Napoleon Bonaparte? Ah, I thought, a socially redeeming film, dealing with actual historical events – something far better than the steady pattern of cinemas about fantasy and space and



werewolves and crime. Well, frankly, yes, and no. "Yes," insofar as the story doesn't flow from a contemporary fantasy life rich in blood and gore and crime and revenge; but "no," insofar as Napoleon's biography in this movie begins with the beheading by guillotine of the last Queen of France, Marie Antoinette. Holding up the severed head may be historically accurate as a sort of "crowd pleaser" as the crowds of Paris understood that royalty lived in grandeur while ordinary folks live in penury. The storied French Revolution unleased pent-up grudges and unresolved conflicts. The argument in the infamous "reign of terror" held that people had been terrorized for generations by kings and queen and nobles (and, even, some held, the Christian church) all of whom kept too much for themselves while allowing starvation and poverty. "Justice" required a strong response.

Nearly every scene of Napoleon risen through his military prowess to be named "emperor" keeps the action on the battlefields or in street rioting true to the practices of the time and never skips on wounds and blood and dirt and smoke and gunfire and sharp sword hand-to-hand combat. Eventually, Napoleon will bring some measure of stability to a ravished society.

Beginning this weekend, we will read and sing about "Christ, the Prince of Peace." Of all the titles offered to us and to the world about Jesus of Nazareth and his role in our mixed-up world, Prince of Peace grabs hold of a forged handle for believers to hold and to push or pull.

The **phrase itself**, prince of peace, comes from the **Prophet Isaiah (9:6)**, who speaks an ancient longing for power oriented not to personal advancement, but **power pointing to the rule of God over humanity** and especially for Isaiah, power that will keep Israel, the Bride, in a strong relationship governed by love.

When I was in college and graduate school, an elderly priest prayed aloud faithfully and daily, for the end of war in Vietnam. Father Charles didn't care if someone else beat him to this petition; he thought that a second petition was better than none at all. He knew some men and women in the war.

Sheila Alewine believes that you and I have at least **reason that Jesus**, the Messiah, the Christ, **still brings peace**. Isaiah prophesied that the coming Messiah would be the Prince of Peace. Why Prince? Why not King of Peace? A **prince acts under the authority of his father**, the king. While Jesus is fully God, equal with His Father (John 1:1). **He brings peace as the emissary**, or messenger from his Father. Jesus was "sent by God" (1 John 4:9) and "became obedient" by His Death on the cross (Philippians 2:8). Thus, His **role** as Prince of Peace is directly tied to His **role as Savior**, accomplishing the task for which His Father sent Him into our world. Real peace can only be found in Jesus.

Those five reasons? These five instances find the voice in our Communion Rite. 1. Jesus provides us with peace with the Father. 2. Jesus provided peace in our circumstances (listen to the pray after the Lord's Prayer at Mass). 3. Jesus makes peace within our families. 4. Jesus provides peace that rules our hearts. 5. Jesus provided eternal peace (listen for that as we offer peace at Mass).

I suppose that naming Jesus the Christ as the Prince of Peace may seem nothing more than a pious "wish" or "hope" for many Christians. How much more is the working of Christ **for us**. The name "Prince of Peace" is the Hebrew *Shar Shalom*, which means, "the one who removes all peace-disturbing factors and secures the peace." This instantly sets Him apart from those human rulers whose reigns depend on bloody conquest, for **His rule rests on a bloody sacrifice**. Wish some Peace in Advent and you pray for something far more significant than an absence of arguments in a stressful time.
