

Advent Hope – What is it?

For the past two weeks I have reflected here on Peace as an expressed Advent longing. **Today I turn thoughts to hope**. Although we easily offer good thoughts or wishes or expressions of support to people by using the word "hope," we can emasculate hope by rendering hope **nothing**

more than a strong wish for betterment or for success or for healing or for happiness or, even more loosely, for good weather. These "wishes" seem to be lost in murky waters, and even when our best intentions abound, we're offering something too vague to be a real theological virtue, that St. Paul once famously argued would last or endure until the end, as a way offered to us by God as one of three essential theological companions tending toward salvation.

So, what is a better way to understand hope in relation to Advent? **"Hope is** the theological **virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness**, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit." (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1817) If Advent points us directly towards the work that Christ accomplished for us in leading us towards the Kingdom, then this definition of hope firming our desire to be for and with God makes for a **grounded hope**.

Matt D'Antuono, a young Catholic husband and father of nine children, a man with impressive degrees in philosophy and theology, blogs about **real hope and misunderstood hope**. He writes: **"All is not well with the world** and the whole creation groans in agony. Disease, immorality, murder, despair, pollution, prejudice, hatred, division, laziness, poverty, tyranny, confusion, greed, depression — and the list goes on." Furthermore, he asks, "What is the way out? What is God going to do? What is the solution to such a myriad of problems? What revolution is in store?" Matt honestly admits: "I have no idea. So, what do we do? *Hope*."

Matt then asks a question that will shake up our complacency regarding hope: "And what did **God do in response to that [unwell] situation 2,000 years ago**? **He sent a baby** who would grow up to be wrongly accused and killed as a criminal." Matt admits, "That **makes no sense at all**, and there is not even a shred of hope in a story like that **in the eyes of the world**." But especially at Advent and Christmas, we remember God 's ways are not our ways.

True Hope, the Christian theological virtue of Hope, is only really exercised when there doesn't seem to be any hope at all. When all seems completely lost and there is no earthly reason to expect any kind of a solution, that is the time for Hope because our Hope extends beyond the world to the one thing that ultimately matters in the end: salvation.

G.K. Chesterton wrote, "As long as matters are really hopeful, hope is a mere flattery or platitude; it is only when everything is hopeless that hope begins to be a strength at all. Like all other Christian virtues, it is as unreasonable as it is indispensable." If it is a hope that is seen, then it is no true Hope (Romans 8:24-25). St. Thomas Aquinas taught that hope is both an emotion and a virtue, saying that our emotions might become dispirited from adversity or tedium, leading us to tire as we wait, while the virtue remains as a companion on our pilgrimage to the Father.

Last Sunday Pope Francis addressed the crowds in Rome who had brought the representations of the Infant Jesus from their Creche scenes to the Vatican square for a common blessing. Francis told them that **Advent is a privileged moment** for **us to turn to God** who turns towards us. What an unusual photograph this event made: hundreds of people smiling with facsimiles of the Christ Child held in the air, as people sought to take a blessing home to their family tables. **Our only hope: that God's mercy surpasses all of us. Desire God more than desiring any thing else.**
