The Altar Rosary Society will meet on Wednesday, February 7th in the Lucerne Church Hall. The rosary begins at 6:45pm with the meeting to follow.



World Marriage Day



husband and a man loving a woman as his wife. If you are married, this world-wide movement invites you to *celebrate your sacrament with the world* on the second Sunday of February every year, this year on Sunday, February 11, the last Sunday before Lent which begins this year on St. Valentine Day, Wednesday, February 14.

World Marriage Day (WMD) honors husband and wife as the foundation of the family – the basic unit of society. **This very Catholic notion salutes the beauty of faithfulness, sacrifice, and joy in daily married life.** Note that those who conceived this idea as worthy of grand celebration, wished to reference much more than the requirements or obligations that a life-long commitment exacts of us.

This idea of celebrating marriage in this way **began in Baton Rouge**, Louisiana, in **1981**, when couples encouraged the mayor, the governor, and the bishop, to **proclaim St**. **Valentines Day** as "**We Believe in Marriage Day**." The event was so successful in Louisiana that people there decided to present the idea to the Worldwide Marriage Encounter's National Leadership, who recognized a truly good thing for adoption by others in the United States.

By 1982, the Movement noted that 43 governors officially proclaimed the day, and celebrations spread to U.S. military bases in several foreign countries. In 1983, the name was changed to "World Marriage Day," designated to be celebrated each year on the second Sunday in February. In 1993, his Holiness, Pope John Paul II, imparted his Apostolic Blessings on World Marriage Day (WMD). Few other religious leaders, pastors, and teachers, spoke and taught as positively of the unique blessings which God the Father bestows on men and women in and through the Sacrament of Marriage.

From the earliest days of Christians establishing themselves in places far from the Upper Room and Jerusalem Pentecost day, others recognized that Christians who married one another witnessed to some essential characteristics: mutual love and a deep respect for one another; acceptance of children not as a burden but as a gift; charity flowing from the heart of the marriage; chaste love which honors the partner; and, a commitment to one another that surpassed a contract in which each fulfills certain responsibilities.

The Catholic Cathechism attributes the vocation to marriage in a **most fundamental manner to God**, the Creator, who invites persons to "an intimate community of life and love." [1603] The text continues: "The vocation to marriage is written in the very nature of man and woman as they came from the hand of the Creator."

Perhaps on the evenings we are most fatigued or on those days when loving one other person and our families seems to exact too heavily of us, we may read these lines and take them to our prayers: "God who created **man out of love** also **calls him to love**, the fundamental and innate vocation of every human being. For man is created in the image and likeness of God who is himself love. ⁹⁰ Since God created him man and woman, **their mutual love becomes an image of the absolute and unfailing love with which God loves man.**

Ash Wednesday supplants St. Valentine Day this year. However, the **eve of Ash Wednesday** might be a perfect quiet moment to embrace your marriage if you are married, or to recognize that you live now because of the unity of love of two persons, or that in spite of failings, God brought forth you as one to beloved in your life, and that God expects us all to accept the vocation to love as God loves.

Give the heart-shaped boxes of chocolates before Ash Wednesday and enjoy the sweetness of love chosen and practiced with daily affection.
