According to the Gospel, Jesus performed a final act of service for his Disciples, following the Passover meal. Arising from the table, He tied a towel about His waist and filled a basin with water. Then, one after another He washed the feet of each disciple, except Judas, who had already departed to betray Him.

When Peter protested that Jesus was about to wash his feet, Christ admonished, "Unless I wash you, you have no part with me. "After washing the Disciples' feet, Jesus explained what He did and why. "You should wash one another's feet," He told them. "I have set an example that you should do as I have done for you. Very truly I tell you, no servant is greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him. Now that you know these things, you will be blessed if you do them." (John 13:1-17) The point Jesus was trying to make is already spelled out in the Scriptures, and needs little interpretation. We are to serve our neighbors, even if it means we must do things we might not like to do. Even if the work is dirty or hard, or even if we think it beneath us, we must still do our work. After all, Jesus Himself, the Son of God, washed the feet of His disciples. And we are no greater than Jesus, so surely we too should do the same. In church, the foot washing ceremony is an important call for all people that they too should be willing to serve others. In the Catholic Church, this is called the Holy Thursday Mandatum, and the rite takes place after the homily. Members of the congregation are chosen to sit and have their feet washed by the priest, who plays the role of Christ. One by one, the priest will wash the participant's feet with a basin and a towel.

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Dear Parishioners.

Drinking of the Cup

This Holy Thursday evening at the Eucharistic Liturgy officially titled "The Mass of the Lord's Supper," at our parish we will offer Holy Communion under both "species," that is, both the Body and the Blood of Christ. This marks the first opportunity for the congregation at large to receive

again from the chalice after the extended hiatus occasioned by the pandemic that so altered many of our religious actions and devotions. At the recent informal "show of hands" at Mass announcements two weeks ago, roughly half-a-dozen at each Mass responded positively when asked who in this congregation will receive from the chalice when offered.

Reception of the Precious Blood of Jesus will be offered to those who wish to receive it, it will not be imposed or required. Nor will the request of so few mean that the request to receive both species will be denied. As we begin anew, we will continue our practice of distributing the Body of Christ at the front of the side aisles while the Extraordinary Eucharist Ministers will present the Cup with the Blood of Christ at the center aisle to those who come from either of the side aisles.

In the Roman Missal or official prayer book for the celebration of Mass, paragraph 85 reads: "It is most desirable that the faithful, just as the Priest himself is bound to do, receive the Lord's Body from hosts consecrated at the same Mass and that, in the cases where this is foreseen, they partake of the chalice, so that even by means of the signs Communion may stand out more clearly as participation in the sacrifice actually being celebrated."

Further on the same document, in paragraph 281, instructs us: "Holy Communion has a fuller form as a sign when it takes place under both kinds. For in this form the sign of the Eucharistic banquet is more clearly evident and clearer expression is given to the divine will by which the new and eternal Covenant is ratified in the Blood of the Lord, as also the connection between the Eucharistic banquet and the eschatological banquet in the Kingdom of the Father."

Holy Thursday seems to be an appropriate moment to re-initiate this practice. Some of those seeking to receive from the chalice are enthusiastic for the return of this practice. Others still carry fears that we will cross contaminate one another.

If our fears that we may pick up the germs continue to urge caution, we should remember the teaching by which Pastors pass on a 500 year old official teaching: "Above all, they [pastors] should instruct the Christian faithful that the Catholic faith teaches that Christ, whole and entire, and the true Sacrament, is received even under only one species, and hence that as regards the resulting fruits, those who receive under only one species are not deprived of any grace that is necessary for salvation." A Dominican Friar-Priest, Fr. Paul Keller, writes: Some people wonder if it is wrong if they do not receive both the consecrated host and the Precious Blood at every Mass. Many have been told that they are missing out on the full effects of Holy Communion if they receive only the host. The clear answer is that it is completely proper to receive only one form, or species, of Holy Communion.... The time-honored Catholic practice of receiving only the consecrated host also dispels an old heresy called *Utraquism*. The name comes from the Latin word *utraque*, meaning 'both.' There were people who believed that everyone was obliged to receive both the consecrated host and the Precious Blood to be saved."

Father Keller continues: "One great difficulty with this heresy is that it implies that Christ is not fully present under each of the species. Some in our day believe that they are *receiving only part of Christ. But this is absolutely untrue.* The Church explains that Christ, resurrected from the dead, is indivisible. Where His Body is, there is also His Blood, as well as His human soul and His divinity."

A microbiologist from New Jersey, Anne LaGrange Loving, studied Communion Cups in Christian churches to learn if those cups easily spread germs during the typical flu season. **She found they did not**, especially because churches sharing the Blood of Christ from metal cups, washed well before services, protected from germs at the altar, and wiped carefully after each communicant, and those in charge took ordinary measures to protect. Pastors or congregations also advised members feeling ill to avoid accepting the Cup with the Sacramental species.

In all the materials published, it seems that we must balance our faith practice with prudence.


