

Our Body and Our Soul

Dear Parishioners,

Since Good Friday in our St. Louis Church, we have had a **facsimile or a replica of the tomb** from which Jesus rose from the dead. **This year's replica is the best we've created** to date because it shows the shelf within a tomb on which Jesus' body was laid, a feature to be seen to this day in the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem. In Jesus' day, the tomb "loaned" by Joseph of Arimathea provided a space carved out of rock, so that Jesus' corpse was not lowered into a grave, but devoutly placed on a shelf before being shut up in the tomb. This type of tomb we might associate with catacombs in the Middle East or in Rome or Greece. The closest contemporary example might be a mausoleum.



Last weekend I commented on Bishop Kulick's Pastoral Letter wherein he told us that in his opinion, the most pressing adjustment in contemporary thinking from which our faith-life would benefit would come from admitting **that Christians depart from their secular counterparts at the moment when we candidly and honestly admit that our deep way of expressing who and what we are as human beings depends upon our belief that God created us and endowed us with dignity.** Dr. Michael Aquilina authored a study in which he found numerous ways that the first Christians distinguished themselves from their neighbors by the care and respect that they showed towards human persons everywhere. Aquilina points to our Catholic practices regarding the dignity of human beings for the **source of scientific study in medicine and even in psychology.** Think of the Roman Christians rescuing unwanted infants from garbage heaps where the children, often girl-babies, were placed after a formal rejection of the child by the father. Or, think also, in the twentieth century of Mother Theresa rescuing elderly persons in India put out into the streets to die. Or recall St. Frances Xavier Cabrini (as the recent first-run motion picture admirably depicted), a diminutive religious sister, fighting for food, housing, and education for immigrants who were treated as if they were not deserving of the fundamentals for life. The Bishop writes to us to say **"The dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society and of all the principles of our social teaching."**

Moreso, in our Catholic faith, we profess that "every human being exists because of a sovereign, loving act of God, which makes every human life sacred." The Bishop continues, "It is a **biological fact** that a unique human being **comes into existence at the moment of conception.**" Scriptures attest that "God has always known and loved us." Hear some of the implications which we accept: **"Each of us is specifically intended by God. Our lives come from God and belong to Him.** And because all life belongs to God, abortion, murder, capital punishment, euthanasia, and all crimes that offend the dignity of the human person are **grave evils that we must combat.**"

Back to our replica of Jesus' tomb, permit me to observe that many contemporary Christians seem keen to accept that Jesus rose from the tomb, but at the same time may be reluctant to accept that our human bodies are integral to Jesus' Redemption. We may sound like the people in Athens who put Paul off when he spoke about resurrection. Many seem to hold that human bodies inconvenience us by their limitations. Not perpetually comely or handsome, **our bodies seem to be too lowly to be caught up into eternal salvation.** Our Bishop notes that "Scripture is telling us that our bodies are not tools to simply use as we please but should be treated as tabernacles of the Holy Spirit. **Christ offered his entire self – body, blood, soul, and divinity – to the Father that our body and soul may be saved."**

This teaching says something about how we ought to treat our bodies in life and in death, does it not? But more on that topic in another reflection.
