April 23rd is the first day of Passover, **What is Passover?** Passover is a festival of <u>freedom</u>. It commemorates the Israelites' <u>Exodus</u> from Egypt, and their transition from <u>slavery</u> to freedom. The main ritual of Passover is the <u>seder</u>, which occurs on the first two night (in Israel just the first night) of the holiday — a festive meal that involves the re-telling of the Exodus through stories and song and the consumption of ritual foods,

including matzah and maror (bitter herbs).

At this point, four weeks after we commemorated Easter, the pivotal event in time that created our reason for being an *ecclesia* or community, we might pause to reconnect with the world, taking stock of the Universal in Catholic. What has been happening for, in, and about our Church?



From France, from Paris: on April 15, exactly five years

ago, we were shocked to see the medieval Cathedral, dedicated to Our Lady, in full conflagration. I recall driving to visit my father at the nursing home, hearing dad on a cellphone call say that the famous Cathedral was all aflame. When I finally arrived at dad's room, I sat to watch with him what seemed to be the end of a comely, majestic Lady – a church unsurpassed in its delicate tracery and its modeling in stone. Youth and old age kept a tireless vigil as glory went to ash, especially the moment the single spire, totally aflame, crashed to the floor. The following morning we heard the President of France promise a rebuild in five years. Current photos show progress towards an opening on December 8, so that a building symbolizing both the French people's resolve and their faithful resilience. That night in the ashes, for some faith was reborn in a culture become dominantly secular (aside from the Muslims in their midst).

From Rome and the Vatican: The Holy See Press Office announced on Friday April 5, that Pope Francis will visit three nations in Asia and one in Oceania in early September. He accepted the invitation of the Heads of State and local Church authorities to make what will be his 45th Apostolic Journey abroad. The Pope is scheduled to depart Rome on September 2 and return on September 13. The visit will include Indonesia, the largest Muslim majority country in the world, where Catholics number about 8 million. Around 32 percent of Papua New Guinea's population are Catholic, numbering around 2 million, a place where the Capuchins from the Pennsylvania/Pittsburgh evangelized in the Southern highlands, beginning only in 1955. Timor-Leste is overwhelmingly Catholic, accounting for around 96 percent of the population, counting over 1 million people. Lastly, Some 395,000 Catholics live in Singapore, representing around 3 percent of the population. Considering the Pope's recently birthday, Francis shows courage in traveling through so many time zone to encourage the Catholic Faithful.

In the current month, the Pope appealed for Peace in Israel, noting the tragic loss of lives in Gaza and in Israel, met with the families of persons still held hostage by Hamas, advocated for the dignity of the disabled, prayed publicly for those slain in war in Ukraine or devastated by the earthquake in Taiwan. Read the news from the Vatican and you discover an international church in communication with member all over the world and a church that cares about its members everywhere.

After the Resurrection, the New Testament recounts that Jesus send the apostles out to preach repentance through the forgiveness of sins and the coming of the Kingdom. *Acts of the Apostles* tells us how the apostles and disciples responded obediently and what successes and failures they experienced. The breathing of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles in Jerusalem set much of this activity in motion, as it does now.

Sunday, April 21, 2024, the Church observes World Day of Prayer for Vocations (Good Shepherd Sunday). This particular day of prayer is designed to help raise awareness of the critical need to create a culture of vocations in our families, parishes, and schools as we pray for the intentions of vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, and religious life. A culture of vocations is born from the work of each individual's effort in raising the awareness that God calls all of us to a particular vocation in life.

Let us pray that the Holy Spirit will call forth our precious young people to know Him, love Him, and serve Him in our Diocese.
