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Dear Parishioners.

Protector and Guardian

Every year on May 1, the Roman Catholic Church commemorates

Joseph, the Spouse of Mary and the Foster Father of Jesus, as the
patron saint of workers. We honor Joseph as a "hardworking and humble
individual who provided for his family by using his skills as a craftsman." In 1955 Pope Pius XII
declared the feast day of St. Joseph the Worker as a response to the increasingly
communistic climate of the time. The Cold War between western democracies and Marxism
raged as the post-World War II world sought some stabilization that would protect the freedom
of self-determination for societies that had given everything to defeat Hitler and the Nazis.

At that time Marxist Communism argued forcefully for workers' rights, believing that all should work for the same ends, and that no one should (in principle) have more than he or she needed, but all should have basic needs provided by the common work of all. In the west, many workers in free democracies were still subject to the economic markets that controlled supply and demand, and the role of investors that had contributed to the market crash of 1929 and the "Great Depression." The moneyed class enjoyed wealth and privilege about which laborers could only dream. In addition, conditions in mills and mines and shops might be appallingly dangerous. The United States of America, founded first as men and women in free enterprise and as self-directing farmers, could claim equality of opportunity only in principle, while in fact much depended on the will of the individual to work hard and the benevolence of bosses or moneyed investors. At the time of Great Depression and after the Second Great War, some of our citizens flirted with the promise of Communism to assist workers and to provide equally for all.


If the Roman Catholic Church points to St. Pope John Paul II as an advocate for freedom and self-determination and as an opponent to God-less Marxism, many Americans point to President Reagan and our other national leaders who challenged Communism about its unfulfilled promises. The "Iron Curtain" did not protect citizens, but segregated workers and created a privileged class within the "classless society." In naming St. Joseph a Patron and Guardian of Workers, the Church stood up for workers and honored them as worthy of God's protection, flying in the face of Communist claims that God provided nothing at all and that the Church only took from others. So much for history's rhetoric.

In his new Pastoral Letter to us and through the dedication of our Diocese to St. Joseph, **Bishop Kulick upholds the value and dignity of labor**, while honoring the workers of western Pennsylvania who built our communities and our parishes. He accurately predicts that "without workers, our region will lose employers and be passed over by new industry with positions that offer a self-sustaining wage." The bishop adds what we all know, that **we need to retain the younger generation in our region**, thus seeking to provide "opportunities for academic education and professional development, as well as skilled training in the trade industries."

This same letter asks that we support our parishes' and *Catholic Charities'* efforts to address housing, food insecurity, and other financial burdens for all low-income individuals and families. Concluding thoughts point out how we remain dependent on a robust and healthy earth to fulfill the plan of the Creator in caring for our natural home.

Our Bishop alerts us in these well-thought-out observations to think beyond our usual categories, to join the message of the Holy Gospel to our love and concern for our home place. May the Word of Jesus once planted here long ago, grow into a new strong shoot for the future. St. Joseph, please ask Jesus to protect us and to protect the Church to the Glory of God. St. Joseph, Guardian and Protector of Workers, pray for us.
