Dear Parishioners,

Our Pastor's Latest Letter to Us,

On **Good Friday evening**, Our Lady of the Assumption Parish **had the privilege to welcome our Bishop** to our special service commemorating the **Anointing and Burial of Jesus**. That service comes to us via the *Church*

of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem where Franciscan Friars have ministered to pilgrims and local Christians for nearly eight-hundred years. Our adaptation of the ancient service still held there evocatively and experientially affirms that as Christ, Jesus offered everything for us, paying the ultimate price and that even in death Jesus worked for us as He "descended into hell." As one of our parishioners who anointed commented, I never **thought of the real price Jesus paid** until I massaged oil into the wounds shown on our life-sized image of Jesus dead. At the conclusion of the service Bishop Kulick made some clear connections to important, major components which he addressed in his new Pastoral Letter.

On March 19, Bishop Kulick promulgated and published that newly composed letter to us about his vision for us, especially within the next three years. He says that he's beginning his fourth year as our Bishop, the chief Pastor, for all of us. He bases his vision on what he saw and heard from his new perspective as a Bishop (although as a parish priest of our Diocese he knew us well) now responsible for our 78 parishes and the currently somewhat "fluid" number of parishioners as our total numbers slowly shrink from aging, deaths, moves, and departures. You can read the information which seeded the Bishop's Vision of ways to keep our Catholic Faith vibrant in the *Strategic Plan* published on the Diocesan website. Please note that in Pastoral Letter Bishop Kulick presents a plan that is hopeful for our future as a church; he does not conclude pessimistically, "last one left, turn off the lights," as a strategy for quitting or dying. The Bishop offers studied ways to affirm our faith and our firm up our participation in Catholic life.

Uniting his observations around the person of St. Joseph whose role in the Incarnation according to the will of God the Father uniquely honored both Jesus and Mary, one section of the Bishop's document addresses St. Joseph as the *Protector and Guardian of our Christian Anthropology.* Just to clarify a bit, "Anthropology," according to the *American Anthropological Association*, "is the study of what makes us human in societies all across the world." With that definition in mind, it doesn't strike us as unusual that we speak about a Christian Anthropology.

Bishop Kulick writes that "Christian Anthropology considers who and what the human person is based on God's revelation in His word and through our bodies. Indeed, our body is a revelation from God, and by and through it He teaches us. Through this divine teaching we understand the full dignity of the human person. God is the creator of our human nature. He has created us, he made us: 'God created man in his image; in the divine image he created him; male and female he created them' (Genesis 1:27. We give acknowledgement to His plan and the manner in which He fashioned us in the way that we live as individuals and in the way that we respect the created dignity of the other in all of our interactions with them."

Bishop Larry continues, "I fully believe that a renewed understanding of Christian Anthropology is what is needed most in the Church today. It is through this understanding of how we, as individuals, are created by God, and why the failings of today's culture are totally inconsistent with our faith. We must take an active role in promoting the dignity of all life...."

There's more to say yet, about this important insight about our contemporary life, because the implications are vast. Next week I hope to write a bit about key teachings in this wonderful pastoral focus on our Catholic Life in the Diocese.
