

Dear Parishioners,

Making a Pilgrimage

Have you ever made a pilgrimage? Did you visit Lourdes or Fatima or Jerusalem or Rome? A pilgrimage is a visit to a place considered to be Holy, a place where at least some persons experienced the transcendence or the visitation of God upon one person or many.



In the autumn our Bishop intends to sponsor a Diocesan Pilgrimage to the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC. Pilgrimages like this intended one happen weekly at the "National Shrine," and many dioceses bring busloads of pilgrims. When I lived and ministered in the Nation's Capital, I often was invited to hear confessions for the pilgrims in the chapel devoted exclusively to the Sacrament of Reconciliation or Penance. I found it a moving experience to see thousands of people make a pilgrimage and affirm their faith as a Catholic.

Why do we make pilgrimages? Usually because we have been invited to do so or because we wanted to learn more about the place to be visited, or because God tugged at our soul through some grief, tribulation, or appeal, or because the timing seemed to be right in that we could be freed up, and because someone invited us to join the trip. I'd like to invite you to a Sunday afternoon pilgrimage to a place nearby, namely to Loretto.

In my lifetime, I have made pilgrimages to Shrines in Canada (St. Joseph; St. Anne de Beaupre; Cape de Madeline), to the Holy Land (all the places where Jesus lived and taught and manifested the signs of God the Father for us); to Turkey and Greece, especially to where the converted Paul preached Christ Jesus as Crucified Lord to sophisticated, educated persons; to Rome, where Peter allowed himself to be the Rock of Faith for new believers and where Paul also gave up his life to bring non-Jewish believers to Faith and where so many later saints ministered, like St. Felix of Cantalice, St. Philip Neri, St. Charles Borromeo, St. Frances of Rome, and St. Ignatius of Loyola. I also went to Ephesus where St. John cared for Mary and where he governed a faithful church until his death by natural causes. In Germany, we took a very local train from Munich to a countryside town where a saintly Capuchin brother, Conrad of Parzham, served as a doorkeeper to welcome visitors to an ancient shrine dedicated to our Lady of Altotting. Youth and adults sought Conrad because of his reputation for wisdom and holiness. Similarly, I visited the shrine church in Detroit dedicated to Blessed Solanus Casey where a simplex priest welcomed the spiritually needy at the door. In New York city, I prayed at the tomb of St. Frances Xavier Cabrini on the upper west side of Manhattan; later I would visit a site in the foothills of the Rocky Mountains in Denver where God allowed her to do what Moses did in striking a rock to find water for an apostolate she wished to begin there. In California, I also toured the missions begun by St. Junipero Serra; yes, I prayed at his grave also. In near western Maryland, at Emmitsburg, I joined others for Mass and prayer at the tomb and remains of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton. In India people were keen to invite us to the church where the body of the first native-born Indian woman religious was entombed. And, no, I will never forget the opportunity to concelebrate Mass with hundreds of Franciscan-Capuchin friars at the Tomb of St. Francis of Assisi in Italy and later in the church across town at the Tomb of St. Clare and her fellow sisters. We saw with our eyes the simple places she lived and the places where Francis received the Stigmata (Wounds of Christ) and the place where Francis died.

The longer I reflect upon all the holy places I have been privileged to visit, the more I recall persons made holy by God's work. Truthfully, too, I remember happy times with my fellow pilgrims: in Rome some Gelato or Ice Cream late in the day.

Please keep open, Sunday, June 30, midday (at the conclusion of the 11 AM Mass) and join us for an abbreviated bus pilgrimage to Loretto, Pennsylvania, to visit the place made holy by grace in the Life and Ministry of Servant of God, Fr. Demetrius Gallitzin. We have an opportunity in just a few hours to visit his tomb, his home, and the beautiful church dedicated to St. Michael. We will also pay our respects to the Carmelite Monastery and the Third Order Regular Franciscans who staff a Catholic university that has a big impact locally and nationally. We also hope to spend some quiet moments at the Mt. Assisi Schwab Gardens. All of these sites are within three miles of one another. We hope to leave shortly after Noon and return by 6:30.

Like most pilgrimages, we, too, will pray and see sites important to our faith. As one description of a pilgrimage reads, pilgrims often discover blessings upon their return because we cannot be blessed and not find the blessings at work in us.
